Honorable committee members and representatives,

I am writing in to state a resounding Ought to Pass for LD-227: An act regarding Health Care in the State. It means comfort and happiness instead of pain and torment and it is definitely not restricted to transgender folks, though they will be the ones most strongly impacted by having gender affirming care denied.

Banning funding for certain kinds of health care only puts further stress and burden on those who already have to deal with being poor and struggling to keep food on the table and a roof over their heads. Telling someone "never" for health care will lead to you being told "never" for health care that you need someday. I beg you. I plead with you. Choose kindness. Choose compassion. Choose life. And choose to let Mainers be the judges of their own medical needs for their own bodies. We have always operated under a 'live and let live' philosophy in Maine. Today is not the day to change that.
