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Testimony in Support of LD 629 Resolve, To Establish the Task Force To Study Improving Safety and Provide Protection from Violence for Health Care Workers in Hospitals and Mental Health Care Providers

Good morning Senator Claxton, Representative Meyer, and esteemed members of the Joint Standing Committee on Health and Human Services. I am Malory Shaughnessy, a resident of Westbrook, and the Executive Director of the Alliance for Addiction and Mental Health Services. The Alliance is the statewide association representing the majority of Maine's safety net community based mental health and substance use treatment providers. The Alliance advocates for the implementation of sound policies and evidence-based practices that serve to enhance the quality and effectiveness of our behavioral health care system.

On behalf of the Alliance, I am here today to speak in support of LD 629, Resolve, To Establish the Task Force To Study Improving Safety and Provide Protection from Violence for Health Care Workers in Hospitals and Mental Health Care Providers.

We support this bill and believe that violence towards healthcare practitioners and their staff is a serious safety issue that needs addressing. Too often staff are not given the resources they need to safely support someone seeking help. Health care staff and clinicians should have the supports they need to provide their services in a safe and secure manner. This is an issue that needs further review in order to determine the best process for addressing violence that may erupt in a hospital or health care setting.

There should be a process for assessing the person involved and determining if they are in an acute mental health crisis, or in the midst of a bad substance reaction, or if someone is creating a dangerous situation due to simple anger or disagreement with the provider or staff. Different responses should be made according to the assessment results.

It is important to recognize that disruption or violence perpetrated by individuals with mental health and substance use disorders represent complex behaviors related to clinical as well as social components that will not be addressed and are often exacerbated by being arrested. Incarceration also further limits access to healthy environments or supports and treatment options. After treatment and in recovery, individuals given a felony charge will often face a greater struggle with successful community reintegration. Such a felony and the stigma attached, often prevents appropriate employment, housing and social opportunities. These social determinants have been proven as necessary components to an individuals' future mental health and substance use recovery.

With the knowledge that it is best practice to divert people with substance use and mental health disorders away from the justice system, we support this bill. Thank you for hearing our testimony and I would be happy to get any data that you might need.
