

MIRC TESTIMONY SUPPORTING LD 718

An Act To Improve the Health of Maine Residents by Closing Coverage Gaps in the MaineCare Program and the Children's Health Insurance Program"

Good Morning Senator Claxton, Representative Meyer and members of the Joint Standing Committee on Health and Human Services!

My name is Mufalo Chitam. I am here to testify in <u>SUPPORT of LD718</u> on behalf of the board and 77 members of <u>Maine Immigrants' Rights Coalition</u> (MIRC) with a commitment to advancing and defending the rights of immigrants.

Our mission is to improve the legal, social and economic conditions experienced by Maine's immigrants – enhancing their lives while strengthening Maine – through advocacy, information sharing and collaboration both through and among our member organizations.

Passing this bill will help to address inequities connected to the social determinants of health. social determinants of health, such as poverty, segregation, environmental degradation, and racial discrimination. This bill provides MaineCare and the Children's Health Insurance Program (CHIP) coverage for residents of Maine who are ineligible for federal Medicaid or CHIP coverage due to their immigration status.

The population growth in the last 10 years came from "People from Away." A bipartisan legislature in 1996 supported the use of state funds to continue providing MaineCare for everyone with low income, including immigrants. The Maine Kids Count 2021 Report states that in the early 2000s, Maine led the country with low rates of infant mortality. But in 2011 the LePage administration reversed that policy, cutting health care for about 500 people and for the period of 2011-2016 rates steadily increased to a high of 7 per 1,000 births.

Then in 2017, Mainers overwhelmingly voted to expand MaineCare and the report further shows that in 2018 and 2019, Maine's annual infant mortality rate was 5.4, again below the national rate of 5.7 per 1,000 births. Some factors which may have contributed to improvements include MaineCare expansion among other things. Between 2015-2019, the rate of mortality for Black infants in Maine was 64 percent higher than the rate of mortality for white infants. LD 718 closes remaining gaps in access to MaineCare for low-income Mainers including immigrants.

The need for New Mainers to have health care coverage has only been compounded by the pandemic. This bill is important now, especially at this monumental time....and not providing health coverage to anyone population in Maine means we are denying healthcare to ourselves. In the last 12 months, our community organizations have labored to educate our new immigrant communities about COVID19 and Vaccines because they have "internalized this discussion that they don't deserve access to health care because of their status. Passing LD 718 would allow us to have those earnest discussions in our immigrant communities "

COVID19 has shown how important the impact health care has on a person's life, so ensuring all people have coverage shouldn't be something that needs to be debated. Now more than ever "Health care is a right.....It's a right!" And so, we urge this committee to pass this bill.
