RE: L.D. 1223 - An Act To Allow Crematories Using Chemical Dissolution Processes in **Facilities Other Than Cemeteries**

Dear Senator Curry and Representative Roberts:

The Department is aware from experience with a crematory using a chemical dissolution process that the characteristics of the liquid discharge from this process needs to be considered.

We are aware that the liquid discharge may have a high pH (which can be neutralized) and a high temperature. It is important that any liquid discharge from this process be done in accordance with state law to ensure water quality is not impacted, and with the local sewer use ordinance to ensure the local wastewater treatment facility and its workers are not impacted.

Therefore, if a decision is made to move regulatory oversight to the Funeral Board, I am requesting that the Department of Environmental Protection, Bureau of Water Quality, and the Department of Health and Human Services, Subsurface Program be consulted by the Department of Professional and Financial Regulation, State Board of Funeral Service during the rulemaking process specified in Section 2 of the bill.
