My name is Liz Fisher, I'm a resident of Biddeford, a local small business owner, non-binary, and a proud Mainer. I am writing in opposition of the bills before the committee today.

I want Maine to continue to be a place I am proud of and if these bills pass, I'm afraid I won't be able to keep telling everyone I know how happy I am to call Maine home. Maine must stand up against the national political agenda interfering with our rights to make our own laws. The Maine Human Rights Act adopted protections for gender identity in 2005 and changing this act or passing any of these bills would be unnecessary, help no one, while simultaneously causing harm to Maine's most vulnerable people. Is that the kind of state I want to live in?

Right now, people are using transgender and gender-diverse individuals as a focal point to reduce civil rights to a specific group of already vulnerable people.
