Good morning Senator Carney, Representative Kuhn, and Honorable Members of the Judiciary Committee.

My name is Alyssa Goodwin, M.D., and I am a resident of Brunswick. I am here today to testify **in opposition** to **LD 233**: An Act to Prohibit Biological Males from Participating in School Athletic Programs and Activities Designated for Females When State Funding Is Provided to the School, **LD 868**: An Act to Ensure Equity and Safety in Athletics, Restrooms, Changing Rooms and Housing at Elementary, Secondary and Postsecondary Schools, **LD 1002**: An Act to Protect Children's Identification by Requiring Public Schools to Use the Name and Gender Specified on a Child's Birth Certificate, **LD 1134**: An Act to Prohibit Males from Participating in Female Sports or Using Female Facilities, and **LD 1704**: An Act to Prohibit a School Administrative Unit from Adopting a Policy That Allows a Student to Use a Restroom Designated for Use by the Opposite Sex.

All children are created equal and deserve care, respect, and the opportunity to thrive. Schools play a critical role in the social and emotional development of youth, and **all students deserve to feel safe at school**.

These proposed bills would embolden sports spectators, members of the public, and other students to harass and scrutinize girls who do not conform to stereotypical notions of femininity. If passed, these laws would become yet another weapon for bullies—hurting all girls in Maine.

We should be fostering **connection and belonging in schools**, not exclusion. Students who feel connected at school are less likely to face health risks related to sexual behavior, substance use, violence, and poor mental health later in life.

Gender-diverse youth are already a vulnerable population, facing disproportionate rates of bullying, depression, self-harm, and suicide. According to the 2023 Maine Integrated Youth Health Survey (MIYHS):

- 51.6% of transgender high school students in Maine reported seriously considering suicide in the past year—compared to 15.5% of cisgender peers.
- **28.4% of transgender students** reported attempting suicide at least once in the past year—compared to **6.6% of cisgender students**.

It is not gender diversity itself that causes these alarming rates—but rather the stigma, harassment, and abuse these youth endure.

Team sports benefit all children. K–12 school athletics foster connection, confidence, teamwork, and healthy activity. These proposed policies would put both transgender and cisgender girls at risk of invasive and inappropriate gender verification procedures. Policing who "counts" as a girl through any form of sex testing is not only deeply inappropriate—it is a disturbing violation of privacy that exposes all girls to the risk of sexual abuse.

Similarly, **restrictive restroom and locker room policies** increase the risk of harm to transgender youth. Research shows that in schools with such restrictions, **transgender students experience higher rates of sexual assault**. This is especially true for transgender girls, whose risk of being assaulted **increased by 149%** when attending schools with restrictive bathroom policies.

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School administrators across Maine have successfully supported transgender students and protected the privacy and safety of all students. We should focus on providing these schools with support and resources, not blanket policies that harm our most vulnerable youth.

I submit this testimony as a **pediatrician in Maine for over 20 years**, a **school physician**, an **expert in youth suicide prevention**, and as the **Chair of the School Health Committee** of the Maine Chapter of the American Academy of Pediatrics. I speak on behalf of the many patients I have cared for over the past two decades—**all of whom deserve the same opportunities, dignity, and respect as every child in Maine.**
