I have been working as domestic abuse advocate for three years. I do not think that people realize how often people are hospitalized for domestic violence, or the struggles people face when fighting a basic right to safety. I have taken hundreds of calls from clients in domestic violence crisis. Most homicides in Maine are DV-related. In DV-related homicides, most perpetuators are men killing women.
