Good morning Senator Hickman, Representative Sylvester and members of the Committee on Labor and Housing. I am Jason J. Shedlock and I am a Regional Organizer for the Laborers' International Union of North America. I am also a Trustee and Executive Board Member of both the Maine AFL-CIO and the Southern Maine Labor Council and a resident of South Portland. I also serve on the Maine Apprenticeship Council as well as the State Workforce Board. I appear before you in support of LD 1231, "An Act Concerning Climate and Community Investment Projects." Through registered apprenticeships so that we can actually have the skilled builders of Maine's future and with prevailing wage requirements so we can actually compensate them fairly and keep Mainers working in Maine; we can be sure that our renewable energy projects are positioned for success. With a focus on traditionally underserved populations, we can ensure that our workforce looks less like, well, me, and more diverse in gender and race. And finally, but critically, with a preference-weighted system for renewable projects that emphasize project labor agreements, not only do the projects get completed on time and on budget but the economic benefits also reach the workers that build them.

The Laborers' union stands ready to meet Maine's energy needs of today and tomorrow. LD 1231 goes a long way in setting the rules of the game when it comes to workforce standards. I urge you to vote ought to pass. I'm happy to answer any questions you might have.
