Re: L.D. 1436, An Act To Protect Certain Essential Workers from Infectious Disease

The Department has already testified on a similar bill this session. Therefore, I am sending this letter on behalf of the Department of Labor neither for nor against L.D. 1436, An Act To Protect Certain Essential Workers from Infectious Disease.

MDOL does not have jurisdiction to enforce health and safety standards in the private sector. Maine's status as a "State Plan State" provides enforcement authority for state & local governments only. The federal Occupational Safety and Health Administration (OSHA) retains enforcement authority for private sector and federal employers.

Both OSHA and Maine's Workplace Safety and Health Division currently have personal protective equipment requirements and a penalty structure already in place. It is likely that OSHA will propose additional regular and/or Emergency Temporary standards sometime in the near future for private and federal employers, in which case Maine's Board of Occupational Safety and Health will be compelled to also adopt those standards at a minimum for remaining public employers.
