I am totally opposed to LD 2003. I was shocked when Mr. Szanton was quoted in the newspaper saying close to these words after the Cape signatures called for a referendem on the further development of Dunham Court, "Cape Elizabeth does not want to develop affordable housing in their town." That is NOT true. The referendem gatherers learned that Cape Citizens do want more affordable housing as was laid out in our Town Comprehensive Plan. Cape citizens do not want the project proposed by Mr. Szanton, which includes 4 and

possibly 5 Town zoning changes to move forward on the development.

The HP-1489, LD 2003 leaves Maine, and our local towns subject to the rule of legislators and persons not fully acquainted with our local issues over our town governance and town planning.
