We've all experienced the "Up-sell" technique where the mechanic finds 'something' wrong with my vehicle - a questionable windshield wiper, loose trim, or "moisture" on a shock indicating its imminent failure - it was a rainy day - "and we can remedy that for the low, low price of \$750."

I've been told by many mechanics that the State Inspection Sticker - at a reasonable \$12.50 - is merely a scheme to get customers' vehicles into the inspection bay where the opportunity exists for more business. And business is good in this respect. I've purchased several rear wipers for my station wagon, whether it needed them or not, in order to get a 'sticker.'

Although virtually ANY part of a car could be deemed an "Inspection Item", the only thing that REALLY counts is whether it can stop when necessary. I think we can all agree that this is of utmost importance.

Cars are engineered and manufactured far better than they were decades ago when our archaic "once-per-year" inspection laws were written. In these tough economic times, it is time to bring them kicking and screaming into the 21st Century. Please support modifying or eliminating our State Vehicle Inspection Law. Thank you for your time.
