When you go to a restaurant you are handed a menu of all sorts of wonderful things to choose from. You get to choose your drink, your sides, your main course, your dessert. Would you go to a restaurant that only gave you a choice of tuna salad or egg salad sandwich? No, you wouldn't.

Going to Maine's polling station is like going to a restaurant with only two options. Over one-third of the voters in Maine are unenrolled. Over one-third of the voters in Maine do not associate with either of the two old parties. Over one-third of the voters in Maine don't want tuna or egg salad, they want other options.

The hurdles the state legislature has put on any party trying to represent the unrolled voters from having candidates that represent them silence their voices, silence their desire to actively participate in the process.
