Dear Honorable Members of the 132nd Legislature:

By the Authority conferred by Article IV, Part Third, Section 2 of the Constitution of the State of Maine, I am hereby vetoing L.D. 1802, An Act to Implement the Recommendations of the Maine Commission on Public Defense Services to Clarify When an Indigent Criminal Defendant Is Entitled to Counsel at State Expense.

This bill would create a new statutory right to counsel at state expense for indigent defendants regardless of whether their case presents a risk of incarceration. Maine is making progress in ensuring that the Sixth Amendment rights of low-income defendants to criminal defense counsel are fully protected. If enacted, this legislation would undermine that progress by requiring assignment of counsel in cases and circumstances beyond what is constitutionally required. I cannot support creating a new statutory right to counsel when the State continues to struggle to meet even its minimum constitutional obligation.

The Sixth Amendment right to counsel in criminal proceedings only applies if the defendant faces the risk of incarceration if convicted. Every day, prosecutors in Maine use their discretion to inform the court they will not seek jail time for an offense, but request that bail terms be set to protect public safety until the matter is resolved. This often occurs, for example, when a person is charged with the Class E crime of Operating After Suspension. The District Attorney will routinely inform the court and defendant that no jail time will be sought, and the matter will be continued, with the only bail condition being that the defendant not drive until their license is restored. Currently, an indigent defendant in such a case would not be entitled to publicly-funded counsel because there is no risk of incarceration. But if L.D. 1802 were to become law, the State would be required to assign an attorney to represent the defendant in that case. Despite paying the highest hourly rate in New England, Maine still struggles with a shortage of defense attorneys willing to represent indigent defendants. This bill would exacerbate the problem by creating a new statutory entitlement to counsel in a category of cases that the Sixth Amendment does not cover, placing further strain on both the roster of available attorneys and the courts as they work to reduce the backlog in criminal dockets.

This bill will negatively impact the State's ability of the state to appoint attorneys in the cases where counsel is constitutionally required and impede efforts to eliminate the backlog in criminal cases. We should be focused on solving the problem at-hand when it comes to the lack of counsel for indigent people; not making it worse as this bill would. For these reasons I return L.D. 1802 unsigned and vetoed and urge the Legislature to sustain this veto.

Dear Honorable Members of the 132nd Legislature:

By the authority vested in me by Article IV, Part Third, Section 2 of the Constitution of the State of Maine, I am hereby vetoing L.D. 588, *An Act to Enact the Agricultural Employees Concerted Activity Protection Act.*

L.D. 588 is substantively identical to L.D. 525 in the 131st Legislature, a bill of the same name that was enacted and that I vetoed. Because the bill is unchanged, so too is my veto letter:

L.D. 588 would create a new legal framework governing labor-management relations in Maine's agricultural sector. The bill would authorize agricultural workers to engage in certain concerted activity, and create a new regulatory structure for complaints, hearings, and enforcement by the Maine Labor Relations Board. This is complex legislation with cross references to federal law, including the National Labor Relations Act.

Farming is a cornerstone of rural Maine, our economy, and our way of life. Farming delivers fresh, homegrown, and nutritious food, grown by people we often know and trust, to our tables, and it preserves open space and conserves the scenic beauty that makes Maine special. Unfortunately, farmers are now facing a multitude of serious threats to their livelihood ranging from the severe weather that is likely to become worse as the effects of climate change intensify, to PFAS contamination, to inflation, to price pressures, and so much more. These serious challenges are taking a terrible toll. Maine has lost more than 1,100 farms since 2012, including at least 564 farms accounting for 82,567 acres of farmland since 2017.

Against this background, I cannot subject our farmers to a complicated new set of labor laws that will require a lawyer just to understand. Now is not the time to impose a new regulatory burden on our agricultural sector, and particularly not family-owned farms that are not well positioned to know and understand their obligations under a new such law.

In states where agriculture is dominated by large factory farms and corporate interests, it is important that workers receive the protections of strong labor laws. But that bears no resemblance to the agricultural sector in Maine, where small businesses struggle to find reliable help and therefore generally treat their workers very well in order to retain them.

For these reasons, I return L.D. 588 unsigned and vetoed, and I urge the Legislature to sustain this veto.

By the Authority conferred by Article IV, Part Third, Section 2 of the Constitution of the State of Maine, I am hereby vetoing LD 1731, An Act to Increase the Influence of the Maine State Ferry Advisory Board on the Funding and Operations of the Maine State Ferry Service.

This session, the Legislature considered roughly ten bills related to the Maine State Ferry Service (MSFS). The Department of Transportation (MaineDOT) worked in good faith with bill sponsors on many of them to develop compromise language that could appropriately address constituent concerns while maintaining the State's ability to operate a reliable, affordable, and safe ferry service.

LD 1731 attempts to shift the Advisory Board's role from advisory to quasi-managerial. MaineDOT already consults the Advisory Board on budgets, schedules, staffing and vessel operations, providing detailed reports and responding to member questions and concerns at their bimonthly meetings. The Department values this feedback and uses it to inform decisions. However, this bill mandates "consultation" on nearly every operational decision, implicitly seeking to grant the Advisory Board a level of oversight and direction that conflicts with its intended role and undermines the Department's legal responsibility to manage and operate the service.

The State of Maine provides more than \$8 million in annual subsidy to operate the MSFS and has provided over \$12 million in annual capital funding for the six islands served. That level of public investment underscores the State's commitment to supporting these communities. With such a significant taxpayer contribution, the Department must retain operational control to ensure efficient use of funds and consistent service delivery.

For these reasons, I cannot support LD 1731. It is unnecessary legislation that could complicate management of a critical and complex service. I respectfully urge the Legislature to sustain this veto.
